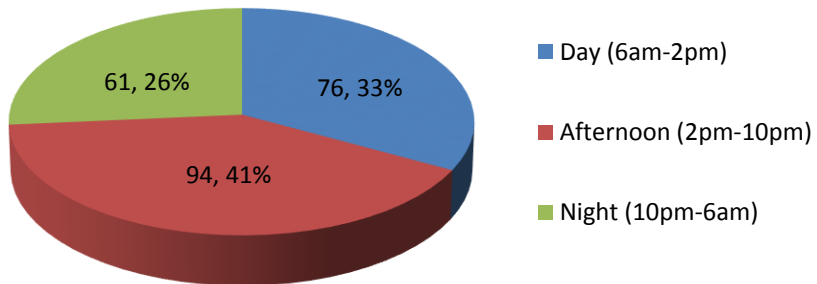


Our Newest First Responder

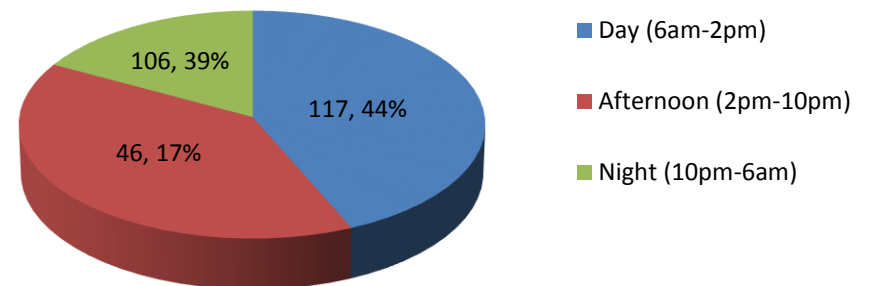

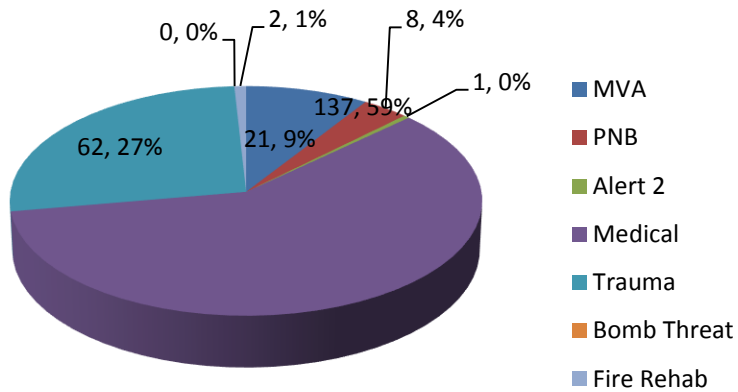

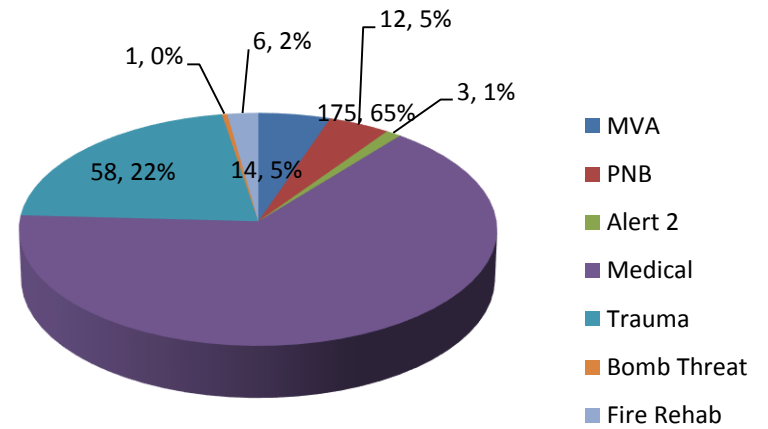


Type of Call

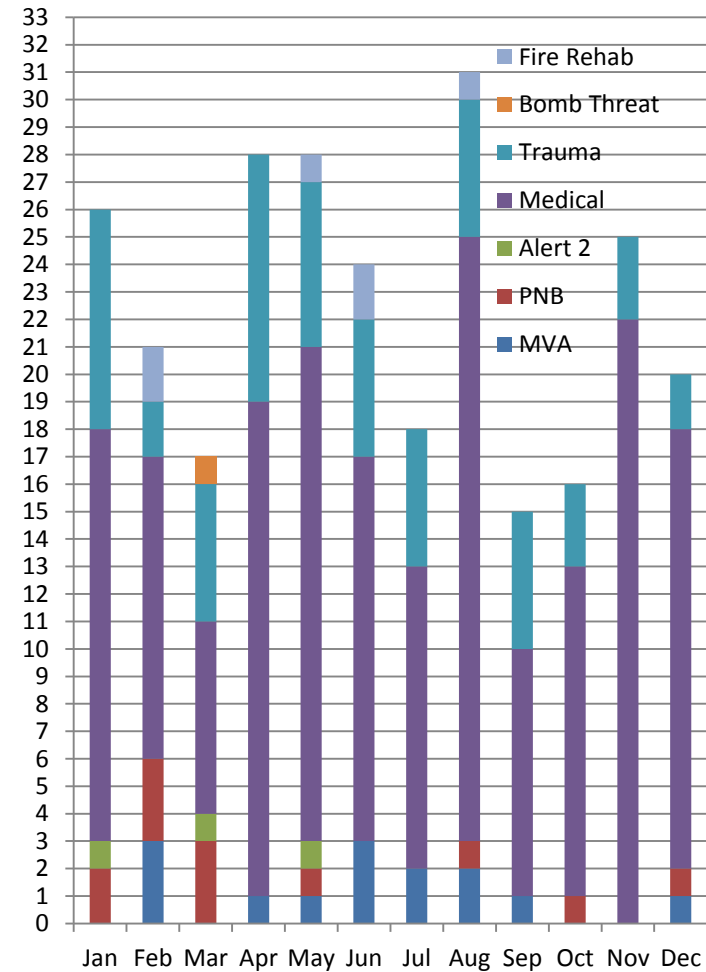
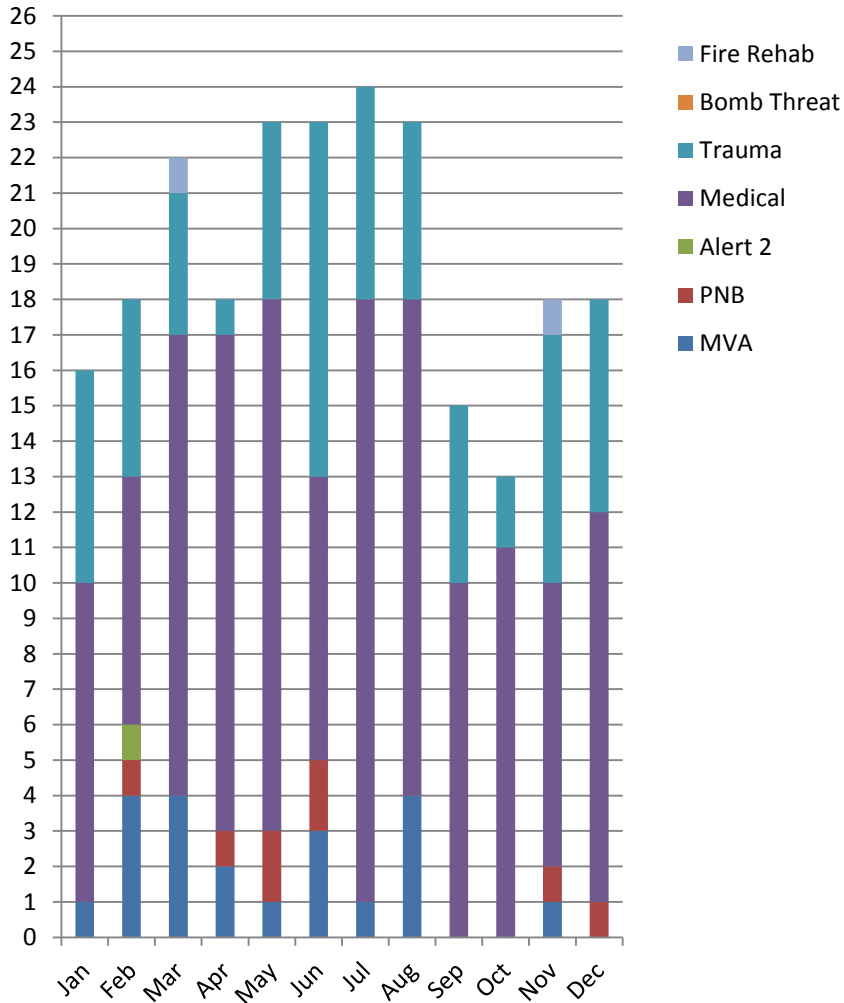

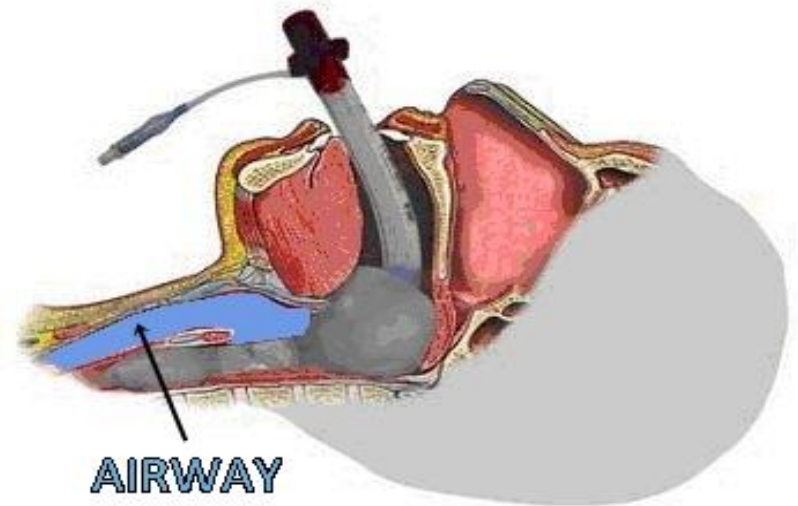

New Airways

Last year we decided to change airways that we use. The Combi-tube is pictured below. It was the first non-visualized airway approved for First Responders. The one on the right is a King Tube. These are the airways we are transitioning to. The reasons for the change are:

- They have a smaller package size
- Easier insertion
- Simpler method of use
- They come in different sizes based on patient height
- High volume, low pressure cuffs



Training in 2012

We train every third Monday of each month before our regular business meeting.

January - First Responder refresher class at the airport.

February - EMS Bag checks and re-supply.

March - S.A.L.T. triage training from Gold Cross.

April - Our annual meeting, elections, and battery checks.

May – Blood Bourne pathogen and TB testing.

June – King tube airway training/certification.

July – Glasgow Coma Scale training from Gold Cross.

August – Carbon Monoxide monitoring.

September – Vehicle extrication with Airport Fire.

October – Department Open House demonstration.

November - Off-road rescue with our Fire Department.

December – Oxygen and IV set up.

A lot of the things we train on are very familiar to all of us, but we want to keep our skills up to date and correct. We strive to provide our patients with the best possible care that we can.

A fact from Gold Cross in 2012-- They had 19 “saves” for the year, meaning a patient didn’t have a pulse and their heart stopped. They were brought back to life and went back to a normal life. Greenville’s First Responders are proud to have assisted with 2 of the 19 saves.



We are also proud to partner with Theda Star Air Medical who come when we need them. Additionally, Outagamie County Airport Fire Department trains and responds with both our Fire Department and First Responders.
