
Newest First Responder




Total Number of Calls




Time of Day

2015






Call Type

2015






Calls by Month

Training

This year was the year we needed to complete our required First responder refresher class. This includes classroom practice, lectures and testing to make certain we remain proficient in all of our skills. It is also required by the State to have a First Responder license.

We also have many opportunities to train with our Fire Department. This helps in how well we work together.



Advanced skill training

These are skills we were approved by the State for and need to train on them every year to stay proficient. Not all First Responder groups do these because of the extra time commitment.

King tube airway Used mostly for heart attacks or anyone with an airway injury or isn't breathing.




Cervical collar used for anyone with a suspected neck injury.



Albuteral treatment for a patient with asthma. Could use this to help open their airway to breathe easier.



Narcan used to reverse an opiod overdose



Glucometer is used to check a blood sugar. Also helps us eliminate other causes.



Tourniquets used to control serious life treating bleeding



We do the extra training in hopes of improving better outcomes to everyone we help. Many thanks go out to all the donations we get throughout the year to help pay for training and the equipment and treatments.

Ballistic protective gear.

We were able to buy 6 sets of this protective gear to use in the event that we have an shooting in our town. These will keep us safe when we are getting victims who are trapped and possibly injured to safety.



Heart saver award

May 5th we received this award for our efforts to save lives through CPR and AEDs.

We were especially honored because we are the first volunteer First Responder group to be given this. It is usually awarded to full time fire/EMS groups.
