
Kaitlyn Skiba

Kaitlyn has been with us for 4 years. She has always been a big help on medical calls and accidents. She was a valuable asset to us and will be missed. We wish her well in the future.







Total Number of Calls




Time of Day




Call Type

Advanced Skill Training

Intranasal Naloxone (Narcan)

We were approved last year and then there was a shortage. We carry these now.



Epinephrine – Manually Drawn

We are approved to give a shot instead of the very expensive Epi-pens. This helps keep our costs down.



Purchased with donations

6 Medical Bags

Last year we were able to buy 6 sets of ballistic gear that included a vest and helmet. They will be used for active shooter/threat incidents. This year to add to the protection for us, we purchased 6 medical bags to care for the victims we are rescuing. The bags measure about 16" by 12" and include safety glasses, triage tags, tourniquets, several quick clot trauma dressings and a soft folding stretcher. They are very compact for the amount of things that we can carry in them.



Advanced skills we have

- Greenville's First Responders take an extra step. To be a licensed first responder there are skills that you need to do to be a State-recognized first responder. To be a Greenville First Responder you need additional training on the following advanced skills:
- Administer intranasal Naloxone (Narcan)
- Administer Albuterol
- Apply extremity tourniquets
- Use carbon monoxide monitoring meters
- Epinephrine manually drawn
- Blood glucose testing
- King LTS-D non-visualized advanced airway
- Cervical spine immobilization
- Use a pulse oximeter

We train to do everything possible to provide our patients with the best possible outcome.
