Welcome to autumn Greenville!

Autumn brings about a colorful and wonderful time of year. The changing of the seasons is most apparent with the changing colors of the fall foliage. Our farmers and gardeners are busy harvesting the fruits of their summer-long labors. As a Town, we are continuing to strive to provide the best services to you and the rest of the citizens of Greenville. I would like to take this opportunity to discuss with you changes we have made with law enforcement in Greenville, changes the Town is seeking for State Hwy. 76, and changes needed for our Town facilities.

I am excited to announce the appointment of Korie Van Berkel of the Outagamie County Sheriff's Department as our dedicated law enforcement officer for the Town of Greenville. For several years, the Town has contracted with the Outagamie County Sheriff's Department for additional law enforcement staffing for our Community. The Town and the Sheriff's Department have redefined our partnership by amending our contract with specific verbiage allowing for the appointment of a dedicated officer to patrol during contracted hours and aid with public safety issues. This change to our contract was handled without having to change the financial terms of our agreement. Officer Van Berkel officially accepted this position in July and will be the consistent, identifiable face of law enforcement in our growing Community.

One area of concern being monitored by the Outagamie County Sheriff's Department and the Town of Greenville is the safety of vehicle and pedestrian traffic along the State Hwy. 76 corridor. The Wisconsin Department of Transportation (WisDOT) has plans for a significant urbanization project slated to start in 2022, encompassing the northern portion of this roadway in Greenville (State Hwy. 15 to CTY JJ), which includes curb and gutter, sidewalks, bicycle accommodations, and storm sewer. An area of even further heightened concern to the Town Board, Town employees, and many Greenville citizens is the two mile stretch of the State Hwy. 76 running from State Hwy. 15 to the north to State Hwy. 96 to the south. Already significant traffic levels along this corridor will continue to increase with new subdivisions proposed to bring well over 500 new homes to Greenville nearby this roadway over the next few years. In addition, this roadway experiences increased levels of commuter traffic from our surrounding communities and at peak times as our own Greenville families deliver their children to our schools.

As a result of the ever increasing use of State Hwy. 76, the Town is taking action to ensure the safety of all. In conjunction with WisDOT, Greenville employees will be performing focused studies along various points of this roadway. The Town is also requesting priority be given to this section of roadway by WisDOT as they begin an even larger study of the State Hwy. 76 corridor along the western edge of

the Fox Valley. The studies to be conducted will collect data regarding volumes of traffic, accident rates, speed of travel, and whether WisDOT levels of service standards are being exceeded. Ideally, any changes to this roadway to enhance the safety of motorists and pedestrians would be funded through state guided efforts and not by the Town of Greenville. However, there are some limited actions the Town can take to help with safety concerns including: additional turn lanes, petitioning for reduced speed limits, and working to manage the pace of subdivision construction. Should you have specific concerns about this topic, I ask you to contact the appropriate resources at state and local levels.

It is the responsibility of the entire Town Board to ensure necessary and desired services are offered to the Community in a cost effective manner. The GFC is taking time to educate themselves on the true needs of the Community and desires of it's citizens. To aid in their education, the committee is asking residents to complete a brief, anonymous survey with questions discussing your desired services offered by the Town and opinion on facility requirements necessary to provide these services. The survey is divided into distinct sections: general services, Town Hall, Public Works, and the Fire & EMS building. I cannot overstate the importance of you completing this survey and returning it promptly for review. The results will be used to identify the desires of you and all citizens of Greenville. -PROOF OF RESIDENCE FOR VOTER REGISTRATION-

Information provided by the State of Wisconsin Government Accountability Board

WHAT DO I NEED TO KNOW ABOUT PROOF OF RESIDENCE FOR VOTER REGISTRATION?

- Proof of Residence and photo ID are two separate processes. A Proof of Residence document is a document that proves where you live in Wisconsin and is only used when registering to vote.
- Photo ID is separate, you only show photo ID to prove who you are when you request an absentee ballot or a ballot at your polling place.

WHEN DO I HAVE TO PROVIDE PROOF OF RESIDENCE?

All voters **MUST** provide a Proof of Residence Document. If you register to vote by mail, in-person in your clerk's office, with a Special Registration Deputy, or at your polling place on Election Day, you need to provide a Proof of Residence document.

*If you are an active military voter, or a permanent overseas voter (with no intent to return to the U.S.) you do not need to provide a Proof of Residence document.

WHAT DOCUMENTS CAN I USE AS PROOF OF RESIDENCE FOR REGISTERING?

All Proof of Residence documents must include the voter's name and current residential address.

- A current and valid State of Wisconsin Driver License or State ID card.
- Any other official identification card or license issued by a Wisconsin governmental body or unit.
- Any identification card issued by an employer in the normal course of business and bearing a photo of the card holder, but not including a business card.
- A real estate tax bill or receipt for the current year or the year preceding the date of the election.
- A university, college, or technical college identification card (must include photo) **ONLY** if the voter provides a fee receipt dated within the last 9 months or the institution provides a certified housing list, that indicates citizenship, to the municipal clerk.
- A gas, electric, or telephone service statement (utility bill) for the period commencing no earlier than 90 days before Election Day.
- Bank statement.
- Paycheck or paystub.
- A check or other document issued by a unit of government.
- A letter on public or private social service agency letterhead identifying a homeless voter and describing the individual's residence for voting purposes.
- Residential lease that is effective on date of registration. (Not valid if registering by mail.)
- An intake document from a residential care facility such as a nursing home or assisted living facility.

This is not a comprehensive list, but categories of the most common types used by voters.

WILL MY WI DRIVER LICENSE OR WI STATE ID CARD WORK AS PROOF OF RESIDENCE?

Only a current and valid (unexpired and not suspended or revoked) Wisconsin driver license or Wisconsin state ID card with the voter's current name and address qualifies as **Proof of Residence**.

HOW DO I PRESENT MY PROOF OF RESIDENCE DOCUMENT?

You may present your Proof of Residence document as a hard copy, paper document or an electronic document on your smartphone, tablet, or computer. An internet connection will not be provided for your use.

WHAT ARE EXAMPLES OF GOVERNMENT AGENCIES WHO CAN ISSUE A PROOF OF RESIDENCE DOCUMENT?

THIS IS NOT A COMPREHENSIVE LIST. THESE ARE ONLY EXAMPLES OF UNITS OF GOVERNMENT.

Government agencies can include local, state, or federal units of government.

- Local units of government include: public school district, city, town or village clerk or treasurer's office, your county clerk or treasurer, and many others
- State units of government include: Division of Motor Vehicles (DMV or DOT), Department of Natural Resources (DNR), Department of Workforce Development (DWD), Department of Human Services (DHS), and many others
- Federal units of government include: Internal Revenue Service (IRS), Medicare (not second party vendors), Social Security, and many others

WHAT ARE EXAMPLES OF PROOF OF RESIDENCE DOCUMENTS ISSUED BY A GOVERNMENT AGENCY?

THIS IS NOT A COMPREHENSIVE LIST. THESE ARE ONLY EXAMPLES OF PROOF OF RESIDENCE DOCUMENTS.

- Fishing and hunting licenses
- Vehicle registrations
- Food stamps, Wisconsin Works, Wisconsin Shares, and BadgerCare notices and correspondence
- Medicare notices and Medicare Explanation of Benefits (not from 2nd party providers or other health insurance providers)
- Social Security and SSI notices and benefits statements
- Public high school, technical college, and public university correspondence and documents, including: admissions correspondence, financial aid notices, report cards, and schedules
- Federal student loan correspondence and notices
- Billing statements and collection notices from a governmental entity
- Correspondence from a federally recognized Native American Tribe living in Wisconsin

WHAT IF I AM UNSURE IF MY DOCUMENT WILL COUNT AS PROOF OF RESIDENCE?

DO I NEED A SPECIAL VOTER ID CARD?

There is not a separate “Voter ID” card. There are many forms of Photo ID, which you may already have, that can be used to vote.

Anyone with a valid Wisconsin driver license or Wisconsin state ID card, or any of the documents listed below, already has the photo ID they need for voting purposes.

WHAT CAN I USE AS PHOTO ID TO VOTE?

The following photo IDs are acceptable for voting purposes, and can be unexpired or expired after the date of the most recent general election (currently, the November 4, 2014 election):

- A Wisconsin DOT-issued driver license, even if driving privileges are revoked or suspended
- A Wisconsin DOT-issued identification card
- Military ID card issued by the U.S. Uniformed Services
- A U.S. passport book or card

The following photo IDs are also acceptable for voting purposes:

- A certificate of naturalization (that was issued not earlier than two years before the date of the election)
- An identification card issued by a federally recognized Indian tribe in Wisconsin
- A driver license receipt issued by Wisconsin DOT (valid for 45 days from date issued)
- An identification card receipt issued by Wisconsin DOT (valid for 45 days from date issued)
- A Veteran Affairs ID card (must be unexpired or have no expiration date)
- A photo identification card issued by a Wisconsin accredited university or college, or technical college that contains the following:
 - Date the card was issued
 - Signature of student
 - Expiration date no later than two years after date of issuance
 - The university or college ID must be accompanied by a separate document that proves enrollment, such as a tuition fee receipt, enrollment verification letter, or class schedule

WHAT WILL THE POLL WORKER BE LOOKING AT ON MY PHOTO ID?

- **Elector’s Photograph**
The photograph must reasonably resemble the elector
- **Elector’s Name**
The elector’s name must conform to the name on their voter registration; conform does not mean that the name must be identical to the name on the voter registration
- **An Expiration**
If the ID has an expiration date, it must meet the expiration requirements listed above

An acceptable Photo ID for voting does not have to include a current address.





BUILDING PERMIT CLARIFICATION

We feel a need to inform homeowners that the building permit taken out for the principal structure is only for what was submitted with the plans. Most likely this did not include finishing the basement, deck, or any other item not on the approved permit. Failure to obtain a building permit can result in double fees and/or citations.

BUILDING PERMITS

Since the construction season is now upon us, residents are reminded that building permits are required for the following projects:

- Construction of any building (house, garage, shed, or any structure)
- Additions to any house or structure
- Re-roofing
- Fences
- Decks, Porches, or Pergolas
- Remodeling of any sort (including finishing any basement area, windows, or doors)
- Heating or air conditioning (new or replacement) including garage heaters
- Electric work
- Plumbing
- Any moving or demolition of buildings

Please plan ahead. The amount of time to issue any permit may take up to five (5) working days.

Again, failure to obtain a building permit can result in double fees and/or citations. We'd also like to make you aware that there have been issues arising at the time of home sales that have been caused by building permits not being pulled for work that has been done on the home. This has resulted in some sellers losing their buyers.

BRUSH PICK-UP

Brush will be picked up from Town of Greenville residential homes the 2nd Monday of every month. Greenville residents need to be on the Brush Pick-Up List for the Public Works employees to come by with the chipper. To be added to this list, call the Greenville Municipal Building at (920)757-7276 BEFORE the Friday prior to the 2nd Monday. If there are an exceedingly high number of people on the list, your brush may not be picked up on Monday, but early in the week.

For brush to be picked up it needs to be placed in a NEAT PILE WITH THE CUT ENDS FACING THE ROAD, lying in front of your house in the Town right of way. Piles not stacked neatly with the cut ends facing the road will be left for the homeowner to bring down to the yard waste site. It will also not be picked up if it is in your neighbor's yard or on a private road. All branches need to be at least 36 inches in length, no larger than 8 inches in diameter or exceed 50 lbs. in weight. No root balls, stumps or construction material will be accepted. Please do not put waste, grass clippings, shrub trimmings or leaves at the curb, they will not be collected and may cause your brush to be left.

If the Town Public Works Crew spends more than 20 minutes at a stop, the property owner will be charged at a rate

of \$200 per hour, with a minimum charge of \$100. The purpose in doing this is to be equitable to all the Town taxpayers. The crew will not stop after 20 minutes but will continue until all of the brush is chipped.

SNOW PLOWING

Well it is that time again when we need to start thinking about the cold weather and snow of our Wisconsin winters. When the snow does start, we want to let everyone know that the Town of Greenville will not start plowing the roads until after the storm or when three (3) inches of snow accumulates on the roads. We will start with main roads and work our way around Town to the less traveled roads such as residential roads. This also means that sometimes residential roads will not get plowed, meaning that the road temperature is high enough to melt on its own. Just a reminder that we will keep on top of large ice patches, but that does not mean that all roads will be free of ice, so DRIVE SLOWLY AND SAFELY. For snow plowing routes and our Winter Maintenance Policy, see the new Town of Greenville website under the Public Works section at www.town-ofgreenville.com.

When snowplows are on the road, please be considerate and leave plenty of room for them. Snowplows do back up frequently and it is hard to see vehicles that are directly behind the plow. If you cannot see the mirrors, the driver cannot see you!

Also if a storm is predicted, please do not park your vehicle on the road. This will help the Town of Greenville employees to clear the roads to the best of our ability. Just a reminder that NO vehicles can be parked on Town roads between the hours of 12:00am and 6:00am from midnight on Nov. 15th through midnight of March 31st of the subsequent year. During times when snow plows are clearing snow off roads, please do not park on the roads. This way we will be able to effectively clear all the snow. Town employees are unable to pull anyone out of ditches, but we will stop to make sure you are ok and have a phone to call someone for help.

As of February 15, 2008, the Town of Greenville has adopted an ordinance that bans depositing of snow in public right-of-ways. This means that any snow that is plowed may not be deposited on any street right-of-ways, including ditches, paths and walkways. Snow may also not be pushed across or into Town roads. All snow that is cleared from your driveway must be deposited onto your own property. The Town of Greenville may issue citations from \$25-\$250 for repeat violations.

PUBLIC WORKS

Residents are responsible for clearing their mailboxes of snow that may hinder mail delivery.

Parents, do not let children play in the right-of-ways, when a plow comes through they may not see a child in the ditch. To keep from harming anyone, please do not play in the ditches.

TOWN OF GREENVILLE MAILBOX REPLACEMENT POLICY


The Town of Greenville has adopted the following policy for mailboxes damaged directly by Town crews during snow plowing:

- Claims must be submitted to the Public Works Department within 36 hours after damage. All claims will be reviewed by Town Employees to be repairable or need of replacement.
- The Town will only replace mailboxes that are physically hit by the snowplow. Any mailboxes that are damaged by flying snow or other vehicles will not be repaired or approved for replacement.
- Only correctly installed mailboxes will be repaired or replaced. The resident is responsible for installing their mailbox to Town and Post Office standards.
- All mailboxes that are able to be repaired to working condition will not be replaced. Scratches, dents etc., that do not affect the mailbox from working properly does not constitute a need for replacement. Town crews will fix the damage to the best of their ability and the claim will not be approved for replacement.
- All residents whose claims are approved for replacement have two options:
 1. Upon request, Town Crews will install a replacement mailbox. If Town crews are replacing the mailbox, the Town of Greenville will provide the replacement mailbox and materials, therefore, no reimbursement of materials or mailbox will be given to home owner. A standard black mailbox and 4x4 post will be used to replace all mailboxes the Town installs.

2. The Town will provide reimbursement up to \$50.00 per mailbox damaged by Town crews. Reimbursement is limited to material cost only and must be installed by the home owner to Town and Post Office standards.

- Residents who choose to purchase and install their own mailboxes, must complete installation and turn in the receipt and damaged mailbox to the Public Works Department BEFORE May 1st. All reimbursement approvals are void after this date and will not be reimbursed.
- New mailboxes installed by the home owner must be installed in accordance with Town and Postal Service standards.

These diagrams illustrate a properly installed mailbox according to Town standards.

FALL SAFETY TIPS:

This October's fire prevention week theme is **"Don't wait- Check the date! Replace smoke alarms every 10 years."**

The National Fire Protection Association recommends the following:

- Smoke alarms should be replaced every 10 years.
- Make sure you know how old all the smoke alarms are in your home.
- To find out how old a smoke alarm is, look at the date of manufacture on the back of the alarm; the alarm should be replaced 10 years from that date.

We'd also like to remind people of the following relating to Carbon Monoxide (CO) alarms:

- Install one on every level of your home
- Test CO alarms monthly by using the test button.
- Replace all CO alarms every 6 years or sooner if they don't respond properly when tested.
- Change your CO and Smoke alarm batteries twice a year (at daylight saving time).
- Take an alarming CO detector seriously. We've had several calls lately, where a CO alarm was going off, the homeowner didn't think much of it and we actually found a dangerous amount of CO and/or Natural Gas. CO is a tasteless, colorless, and odorless gas that is poisonous to humans and can lead to death. **PLEASE TAKE CO AND SMOKE ALARMS SERIOUSLY. WHEN YOUR ALARM GOES OFF, EVACUATE TO FRESH AIR AND CALL 911.**

Wood/Pellet Stoves and Fireplaces:

- Be sure the fireplace or stove is installed properly. Wood stoves should have adequate clearance from combustible surfaces and proper floor support and protection.
- Have the chimney inspected annually and cleaned if necessary, especially if it has not been used for some time.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

- Do not use flammable liquids to start or accelerate any fire.
- Keep a glass or metal screen in front of the fireplace opening, to prevent embers or sparks from jumping out, unwanted material from going in, and help prevent the possibility of burns to occupants.
- Don't use excessive amounts of paper to build fires in fireplaces. It is possible to ignite creosote in the chimney by overbuilding the fire.
- Never burn charcoal indoors. Burning charcoal can give off lethal amounts of carbon monoxide.
- Keep flammable materials away from your fireplace mantel. A spark from the fireplace could easily ignite these materials.
- Before you go to sleep, be sure your fireplace fire is out. NEVER close your damper with hot ashes in the fireplace. A closed damper will help the fire to heat up again and will force toxic carbon monoxide into the house.
- If synthetic logs are used, follow the directions on the package. NEVER break a synthetic log apart to quicken the fire or use more than one log at a time. They often burn unevenly, releasing higher levels of carbon monoxide.

Furnaces:

- Be sure all furnace controls and emergency shutoffs are in proper working condition.
- Do not attempt repairs yourself: leave furnace repairs to qualified specialists.
- Check the flue pipe and pipe seams. Are they well supported and free of holes and cracks? Soot along or around seams may be an indicator of a leak.
- Is the chimney solid, without cracks or loose bricks? All unused flue openings should be sealed with solid masonry.
- Keep trash and other combustibles away from the heating system.

- It is important that you have your furnace inspected to ensure that it is in good working condition.

Prevent Clothes Dryer Fires by Doing the Following:

- Clean the lint screen/filter before or after drying each load of clothes.
- Clean the dryer vent and exhaust duct periodically.
- Clean behind the dryer, where lint can build up.
- Replace plastic or foil, accordion-type ducting material with rigid metal ducts.

If you have a dehumidifier in your home or business, check the link below to see if yours is on the recall list. Please take this recall seriously. We have had several fires in Greenville and the Fox Valley where dehumidifiers were involved. The recall claim process is very easy. FIRST RESPONDERS

Wow where did summer go! The Greenville First Responders have responded to 186 calls from Jan. 1st, 2016 through the end of July which is ahead of last years calls at the same time period in 2015 where we had 178 calls. Since the last newsletter we have conducted interviews to add a new member to our group. Tom Kempen, a Greenville Firefighter, was chosen and started as a First Responder August 1st. He will be a valuable asset to our group as he has been a big help at accident scenes where our Fire Department was helping out.

With money donated and money earned at the Summer Send-Off of the Bill Tesch Memorial Concert we were able to purchase 6 sets of ballistic gear at a cost of \$1,300 per set. Each set includes an armored vest, a helmet, and a small medical kit. They will be used for our protection if we ever have a shooting incident in Greenville. If a shooting event ever happened we would enter the scene and search for shooting victims escorted by the police. If victims were found we would get them to a safe place for medical attention as fast as possible. We are very happy we are able to purchase products like these to help keep us safe and to help save lives.

As stated in the last newsletter, we are now trained to administer the drug Narcan. Narcan is the drug that neutralizes drug overdoses. Unfortunately, Narcan is in short supply right now and if we buy it now it might expire so we decided to wait until supply catches up with demand and were hoping that will happen in the next few months.

Now that fall is here schools are in session again and school buses are out picking up our kids. With cooler weather and school in session there's always an increased number of people walking, jogging, and biking. And in a few months the weather will also be starting to change and driving conditions will also change. Here are some helpful hints and things to think about.

Driving procedure for stopping for a school bus:

Always use extreme caution when approaching a school bus. Children do not always pay attention to their surroundings and it's our responsibility as drivers to always use caution. All vehicles must stop on the street or highway 20 feet or more from any school bus with flashing red warning lights and stop arm extended. This applies to vehicles approaching from the rear and opposing lanes. All lanes of traffic must stop for the school bus, except in opposing lanes if the highway is divided with a center median. No vehicle may proceed until the bus resumes motion and has turned off the red warning lights. The stop arm on the bus is an added communication to other drivers, but the lack of an extended arm is not reason to pass a bus

whose red lights are flashing. A vehicle owner can be cited when the driver of a vehicle passes a school bus illegally. A law enforcement officer need not witness this violation if the school bus driver reports it to the law enforcement agency within 24 hours. Fines can be quite high; up to \$300.00 for illegally passing a school bus, but the risk of hitting a child is even higher.

***Safety Tip:** Most school bus-related deaths and injuries occur while children are crossing the street after leaving the bus, not in collisions involving school buses. So after you stop for a school bus, watch for children along the side of the road. Drive slowly until you have passed them.

Safety guidelines for walkers, joggers and students going to school using roadways without sidewalks:

- Stay on the shoulder, off the roadway.
- Walk against the flow of traffic. (You must face oncoming traffic)
- Wear bright colored clothing.
- Walk during daytime hours/at night wear light colored clothing and/or reflective clothing.
- Riding bikes or skate boards, always wear a helmet.
- Cross the roadway at an intersection. Look both ways before you cross the street. Make eye contact with any driver who may be turning. Give them a wave. Make sure they see you. In a car-walker interaction, you can only lose.
- Walk single file, unless you are on a sidewalk separated from the road, you should walk single file. This is especially important on a road with curves, where traffic has only a split second of seeing you. Just remember it may be enjoyable to walk down the road two or three abreast chatting merrily, but drivers don't expect it and you may lose in the end.
- Keep the volume down; don't drown out your environment with your iPod. Keep the volume at a level where you can still hear warnings from drivers, walkers, runners and bikers.
- Hang up; talking on a cell phone while you walk or bike is as dangerous as talking while driving. You are less likely to recognize traffic dangers and other hazards. Potential criminals see you as a distracted, easy target.
- Be aware of stranger danger; choose your walking route for paths frequented by other walkers, joggers and bikers. If you see someone suspicious, be prepared to alter your course or go in to a public building to avoid them. Acting alert and aware can convince bad guys that you're not an easy target.

FIRST RESPONDERS

- Know when to stop walking, heat sickness, dehydration, heart attack or stroke can strike walkers and any age. Learn the symptoms of medical emergencies and carry a cell phone to dial 911.

Driving in Fog

This time of the year we may have to drive in more foggy conditions than any other time of the year. The best advice for driving in fog is to delay the trip until conditions improve. However, this is not always possible so remember fog can limit visibility to less than 50 feet at 60 miles per hour. That's just over half a second in front of you. It is imperative to do everything possible to increase your vision as well as alert other drivers of your intentions as early as possible.

Visibility

It is difficult to notice fog becoming thicker, so visibility can decrease without you being aware of it. To increase your vision, use windshield wipers and the defroster to minimize any condensation on your windows. Also be sure to use your low beam lights because high beam lights reflect back to your eyes. For guidance in following the road, follow the solid lines on the outer lanes.

Following Distance

With decreased visibility comes a decreased amount of time to react to other cars, road changes, pedestrians and even animals in the road. At high speeds, the car can reach unseen objects in the distance before you have a chance to react to it. While it can be very reassuring to have a car in front of you to follow, you still need to keep a proper following distance. You can judge how close based on the skip marks-the white dashes between lanes on the highway. Each skip mark is about 40 feet apart so if you can't see any skip marks you are too close. Try to stay as far back as possible while keeping the vehicle ahead of you in sight. Fog also makes roads damp so braking will require a greater distance to stop or slow down. Not using cruise control will give you better control of your vehicle.

Alerting Other Drivers

Not only does fog increase the chance of having problems with keeping your vehicle on the road, it also increases the chances of being surprised by the actions of other drivers. Giving other cars the maximum amount of time to react will help to avoid accidents. Though you should not change lanes unless you really have to, when you do, turn on your blinkers well in advance of the change so other cars can react. Also, try to apply the brakes gradually so other drivers will have a chance to react and avoid a pile up.

Transportation Riding Safety

Did you know that the air bag that saves your life could also kill you or your child? Air bags are not soft, billowy pillows. They are bags that can come out of the dashboard at up to 200 miles per hour, faster than a blink of an eye. I have seen children riding in the front seat of vehicles without seat belts and children who have their feet up on the dashboard that have no clue what could happen to them if the air bag deployed at that instant. It's better to be safe than sorry. Always stay in a sitting position with your feet on the floor. All drivers should use common sense when traveling with children. Drivers can prevent air bag-related injuries to adults and children by following these critical safety points:

- **Make sure everyone is buckled up.**
- **All children ride safer in the back seat (12 and under, or under 90 lbs.).**
- **Anyone in the front seat must wear BOTH the shoulder and lap portions of the seat belt.**
- **Always put a baby under age 1 in a rear-facing car seat in the back seat and make sure the car seat is properly installed.**

It's been a great summer visiting with all of you at the various Greenville events. We love meeting our neighbors and the children who are always so eager to learn and always have lots of questions. Stay safe in the winter months to come. It is always and foremost our goal to keep you safe so please read this newsletter to your children. They learn from example so if you use these safety tips so will they.

GREENVILLE CONSTABLE

I would ask that you pay close attention to the topics this quarter as it appears that most people were/are not aware of the statutes associated with these topics.....

Why do I need to get a Rabies vaccination for my dog or cat?

The State of Wisconsin requires that all dogs over the age of 5 months be vaccinated against rabies. Some municipalities also require that cats be rabies vaccinated. Why? Rabies is a deadly virus that can be spread to people and animals from the saliva of infected animals. The State also requires that dogs over the age of 5 months be licensed within the municipality in which they live. Some municipalities also require that cats be licensed.

Why do the rabies vaccinations and licensing go hand in hand? From a small scale exposure to a large scale exposure licensing records are the quickest means of determining where the population of dogs/cats are so that notification can be made.

All warm-blooded animals are at risk for contracting rabies, however, some species are much more resistant than others. Transmission of the virus is almost always through a bite from a rabid animal. There are a variety of different symptoms and once contracted there is no cure and death is almost always the outcome. The disease is very preventable through vaccination. While relatively rare in humans, the risk of contracting it, and the outcome of the disease make taking precautions with wild animals and vaccination of domestic animals essential.

So what happens if your dog or cat bites or scratches someone?

In Greenville, the first thing that will happen is the bite or scratch will be reported and you as the dog/cat owner will get a visit from an Outagamie County Sheriff's Deputy. The Deputy will ask for your pet's Rabies Vaccination Certificate. If your dog or cat has a current rabies vaccination you will be required to quarantine your pet at your home for 10 days. You and the Deputy will fill out a Quarantine Form and a copy of that form will be given to you along with the instructions and requirements of the Quarantine. Your pet will need to see a veterinarian 3 times within that 10 day period. These cost of these visits are your responsibility. The first visit must happen within 24 hours of the bite/scratch, the 2nd, on Day 4, 5 or 6, and the 3rd check on Day 10. You will need to take the Quarantine Form along for the Veterinarian to sign each visit. The Deputy will advise you what to do with the completed form at the end of the Quarantine.

Now, if your dog or cat is *not* current on their rabies vaccination or they have never had a rabies vaccination and they have bitten or scratched someone, the bite/scratch will be reported and you will be visited by an Outagamie County Sheriff's Deputy. The Deputy will ask for your pet's Rabies Vaccination Certificate. If your pet has not been vaccinated or, it is not current you will be required, by State Statute, to bring your pet to a licensed holding facility for the 10 day Quarantine. The cost of the Quarantine is the responsibility of the pet owner or guardian and payment is required at the time of delivery of your pet to the facility. The holding facility is responsible for caring for your pet for the 10 days of the Quarantine and the 3 vet checks will be done by them.

Licensed holding facilities in this area are Veterinarians, but please understand that most do not do bite/scratch Quarantines so please check before you just take your pet there. Fox Valley Humane Association also is a licensed holding facility.

What happens if I choose not to quarantine my dog or cat that has bitten someone?

Refusal to comply with an Order to Quarantine is a citable offense and the fees are at a higher monetary level than ordinance violation fees.

The story this issue is one that is very dear to my heart and one that I wish I had written sooner.

It was the end of June 2014 and the torrential rains we had seen were finally becoming a memory. Although most ditches were still overflowing, their banks and waters were running swiftly.

I had just picked up a stray dog and was on my way to FVHA with him. He and I were jammin' to the radio when I passed something on the side of the road that I was sure was a small kitten sitting on the shoulder. As I quickly glanced in my rearview mirror I caught a glimpse of the poor little thing rolling down the embankment, having gotten caught up in the draft of my vehicle. I turned around and just as I was getting out of my truck the cutest grey tabby kitten was working her way back up to the shoulder of the road. She was soaking wet, her right eye was gummed shut, and she was wheezing. I quickly scooped her up and as I turned to cross the road back to my truck, I heard very weak meowing coming from the ditch.

The ditch was mostly tall weeds; cattails and about 12 inches of fast running water. I quickly found another grey tabby kitten floating in the water. She had gotten hung up in the weeds but was struggling. I rushed those two back to my truck and got them wrapped in a blanket. I then ran back to make sure there were no more. I could still hear the faintest meow sound coming from the ditch. I was wading through fast moving water, up to my knees, spreading apart weeds as fast as I could but couldn't find the source of the sound. Finally there he was! I almost missed him, because all I saw was the tip of his little black nose and his two eyes above the water. I scooped him up before he could get any further down that ditch.

As we walked back to my truck, I could see that this little guy was in trouble. He was half the size of the two girls and he looked like death warmed over. His eyes were ulcerated and he was just skin and bones.

His sisters had already fallen asleep on the seat wrapped in the blanket. I wrapped this little guy up in his own blanket and stuffed him in my jacket.

I called the girls at FVHA to let them know what I was bringing in so the vet staff was prepared. All the way to the shelter this little guy kept crawling out of the blanket and parking himself in the crook of my neck. I would put him back in the blanket in my jacket. He would crawl back out.

After their exams, diagnosis of pneumonia, ulcerated eyes in the little guy, upper respiratory and eye infections in the girls, and medications prescribed it was felt that the kittens stood the best chance of survival in a foster home. Unfortunately, none were available.

Well, this gal is one who never really was a cat person, whatever that meant. It didn't take long to decide to become one. I was determined that these kittens were going to make it, especially the little boy. I was advised that the reality of

the situation was that his chances of survival were not good. I won't say that the next 6 weeks were easy, anything but! The girls healed quickly and thrived! However, the little boy took two steps forward then three back for the first 4 weeks. Finally, in week 5 his pneumonia was gone, his ulcerated eyes had healed, and he was gaining weight.

Then in week 6, tragedy hit! One of the little girls developed FIP. Two veterinarians confirmed the diagnosis. FIP has no treatment, no cure, and is always fatal. As poor sweet little Morgan was only suffering and would only continue to suffer we made the difficult decision to humanely euthanize her. I held her during, wished her safe travels to the other side, and said good bye.

By week 7, the remaining kittens, Zoe and Bob Bob, weighed enough to be spayed/neutered and put up for adoption. Zoe, as we had named her, already had a new home awaiting her. Bob Bob, however, was too scrawny looking so he came back home with me until he filled out some more.

Over the next several weeks, a couple of people expressed an interest in him but none seriously.

By early October, no one had adopted Bob Bob and truthfully we had become quite attached to him and him to us. We made it official in mid-October.

We still call him Bob Bob, as he literally looked like a bobber in the water that day I found him floating down the ditch. I truly think he had every intention from that very first day of adopting us and he made sure of it by climbing onto my shoulder and snuggling into my neck not once but twice!

Crazy enough, 2 years later Bob Bob is still fascinated with water. He will jump in the dish water while I'm doing dishes and has even gone into the shower on occasion.

I look at this as not a Foster Failure but as a Foster Fantastic!!!

In rescuing animals, I lost my mind but found my soul.....

PARK RESTROOMS CLOSING

The restrooms in the parks will be closing on or near October 1st for the season. While the restrooms may be closed, the parks remain open all through the winter. Be sure to get out and enjoy them through the fall and winter months as there are many activities that can be enjoyed during this period.

STREET TREES

Street trees are planted during the spring on lots that have an established lawn. If you received trees in front of your home, please help us care for them by keeping them watered during the summer through fall. You should have received a letter along with a care sheet earlier this spring. If you didn't or need another copy please contact us and we will get another copy to you. Keeping the tree properly watered is very important for the establishment of these young trees but remember that over watering can kill a tree just as easily as under watering. If you received a tree last year, please continue to water it as well. All we ask is that you water and keep the tree mulched. All other maintenance such as pruning, staking or fertilizing will be done by Town staff. If you have any questions or concerns about your tree please feel free to give us a call.

LANDSCAPING IN THE RIGHT-OF-WAY

The Town of Greenville has an ordinance that regulates landscaping within the Town right-of-way. This ordinance requires that a permit be obtained if one desires to perform any landscaping activities within the Town right-of-way. The Town right-of-way typically extends 33' out from the centerline of the road which usually amounts to 15' from the curb. If you are unsure of the location of the right-of-way, please contact the Town Hall. This ordinance only applies to subdivisions with curb and gutter. Landscaping is still prohibited in any Town ditch. In order to receive a permit, you must fill out an application and submit a landscape plan that adheres to the regulations set forth by the ordinance. If you are planning to do any landscaping in the right-of-way, please stop by the Municipal Services Building and pick up a permit application and a copy of the ordinance. This may also be viewed on the Town website. Violators of this ordinance will be subject to a fine and removal of any landscaping that violates the regulations set forth by this ordinance.

NEIGHBORHOOD TREE PROGRAM

The Greenville Parks, Recreation, and Forestry Department has a program that allows homeowners to help fill in tree locations in the new subdivisions. The funding for the street

trees in many of the current subdivisions was provided by fees that were collected on a per lot basis at the time a building permit was issued. Depending on the subdivision, this fee may or may not provide enough funding to completely line the streets with trees, leaving some vacant planting sites. The neighborhood tree program provides homeowners the opportunity to fill in these vacant locations. The homeowner pays for the cost of the tree while the Town will pick up the cost of the planting. The trees will be planted during the spring along with the normal street tree planting. For more information, please call us at 757-7276.

URBAN FORESTRY BOARD




